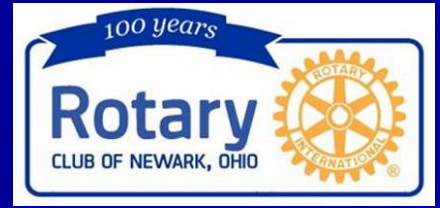

## Last week's meeting

President **Jack Neely** brought the meeting to order at 12:05 p.m. **Tom Slater** and **Peter Larson** started us singing "R-O-T-A-R-Y." **Bob Fitzgerald** led us in the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance, and then we sang an original version of "Going to Rotary" that honored our guest, **District Governor Steve Sandbo**.

President Elect **Chuck Moore** followed by introducing guests: Dory Griley, wife of **T.D. Griley**; Patricia McGaughy, wife of **Bob McGaughy**; and Rotary Guests: **Shane Pyle** (DG Elect), from Coshocton Rotary Club; **Craig Maxey** (DG Nominee), from Reynoldsburg-Pickerington Rotary Club; and Jill Sandbo.

### Announcements:

- August Service Project: Panther Pantry – **Dave Hile** is accepting a wish list of items to fill the shelves of Licking Valley's new Panther Pantry to help needy kids at the school system.
- Heathy Kids Backpack Project: 8/31 – Rotary will partner with the Licking County YMCA to gather volunteers to help pack backpacks so students will have food to eat. There are volunteer time slots in the afternoon. **Chuck Moore** is coordinating.
- District Training Seminar at Zane State College is September 24<sup>th</sup> for all club leadership.
- Jack Neely read a Farewell Card from **Ashley Wade**. She wrote to share her thoughts on leaving the Newark Rotary as she takes a new job in Westerville. She will be transferring her Rotary membership to the Westerville Sunrise Club.

**Sergeant-At-Arms: Pat Jeffries** started off by fining our DG Steve Sandbo for wearing matching sport coats with **T.D. Griley**. He also fined **Sharad Thakkar** for winning a golf tournament last weekend; **Rob Montagnese** for an article on the good work at LMH; **Paul Thompson** for an article about building business; **Nancy Neely** for her Long Drive (albeit short-lived) at the Rally for a Cure; **Barb Quackenbush** for her son's recent success as kicker; and **Doug Ute** for his being awarded a Grant for Hunger Alliance. Pat finished up auctioning two tickets to the first OSU football game. **Kendra Proudfit** was the winning bidder at \$230.

**Program:** Craig Maxey then introduced out new District Governor Steve Sandbo of Upper Arlington Rotary Club. He explained the origin of the Rotary effort to eradicate polio, which began in 1986. The original estimates, while originally high, were much lower than the actual investment that has taken place over the last 30 years. This

year, there are 13 reported cases of polio in Pakistan, 6 in Afghanistan and 2 cases in Nigeria. Researchers are already on the ground identifying the source of each case. Additional investment, partnered with the Gates Foundation, will be needed to eradicate polio permanently. According to CNBC, Rotary International has been recognized as the fifth most impactful organization in the world.

Mr. Sandbo then talked about the main focus of Rotary International for the next year: encouraging clubs to "do what you need to do" to make your club successful. Consider how the telephone has evolved over time to remain relevant in our lives. It has changed from a fixed, wired device in buildings to a multi-function device that includes many tools that we have come to find absolutely necessary for life.

Clubs should seek out ways to demonstrate their value to the community they serve and not focus so much on attendance. Millennials are supportive of organizations that appeal to their values, but they do not find fixed lunch meetings appealing. They want to feel that their efforts make a difference in the community. If you are going to invite someone to Rotary, invite them to participate in a service activity so that they can experience and witness the impact of Rotary on the community. Clubs should always be open to considering new ways of serving the community so that their efforts are relevant. Engagement is very important in building an active membership.

Mr. Sandbo concluded by challenging each member to:

1. Invite a friend to a Rotary project. Show them what Rotary *does* before showing them what Rotary *is*.
2. Do something extra for the Rotary Foundation. The goal is to raise \$300M this year. Please try to give something extra.
3. Do something to make your club more relevant and support change in your club. Help Rotary to be tuned in to community needs. Follow and like Rotary Clubs in social media.

Mr. Sandbo let everyone know that the District Conference will be hosted at COSI on April 29<sup>th</sup>.
