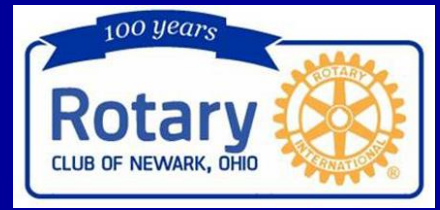

Last week's meeting

Program: **Craig Young**, who worked for many months to secure this program, introduced our speaker, Navy SEAL Jacob E. Newbold, Special Operations Senior Chief and 20-year career SEAL, who received a standing ovation before speaking to our club. He is from Ohio and is the middle of three brothers who all are SEALs.

He's been on eight deployments and more than 400 operations to Iraq, Afghanistan and Central and South America. He's also helped train about 2,000 future SEALs and plans to retire from the military this summer to pursue a career in private business. He's about to graduate with an MBA.

Jacob focused on the intense 63-week training that all prospective SEALs must complete to be placed into service. The "miserable" first phase has an 80 percent attrition rate as candidates are forced to work as a team through a series of grueling mental and physical challenges. The candidates are constantly wet and dirty. The fourth week is described as "Hell Week" where participants have very little sleep in the face of immense challenges, conditions similar to what they could face during a deployment. Phase two involves water training, learning about the physics of diving and being underwater at depth. The third phase included small unit tactical training and helicopter operations among other things. When Jacob was trained, only 14 of 164 finished the program. Most drop out for a variety of physical, mental and other issues.

Among Jacob's many skills are being a sniper and military freefall master. He's fluent in Spanish and Portuguese, which led to his many assignments in Central and South America. He spoke about his work in Iraq protecting their government officials and described Afghanistan as a tough place because you don't know who to trust.

One goal of his visit was to seek advocates for recruiting new candidates to the Navy and especially the SEALs. He's concerned about replacing himself and others who are retiring.

The key to success for the SEAL teams is exceptional "teamability." They need recruits who can lead, follow and think outside the box. The SEAL teams are famous for the rescue of female POW Jessica Lynch during the Iraq War, taking down pirates on the Mersk Alabama ship, and killing terrorist Osama bin Laden among many other successful missions.

There also have been numerous tragedies, including two tragic helicopter crashes he mentioned. In one, on Aug. 6, 2011, 17 SEALs and 16 others perished in one crash, including one of his best friends from his own training.

Just a few days before his speech, Chief Special Warfare Operator William "Ryan" Owens, 36, a SEAL Jacob knew well, was killed during a raid in Yemen where the squad ran into more opposition than expected. Three others he described as friends were wounded. Owens was married with three children.

Jacob described serving as a SEAL as a "tough business" and "an absolute honor." "Somebody has to do it. We signed up for it. We know what we're doing. We know what the possible repercussions are of going out there. ... To serve men and women, like you folks, and to defend our freedoms. There's no greater honor."
