Sergeant-At-Arms: Jon Spahr filled in for **Pat Jeffries**, who was enjoying sunshine in Florida. Jon enjoyed his duties, as he handed out a number of fines. He first fined Lee & Sally Heckman for getting their Blue Badges. **Jerry McClain** was charged \$2 for his phone ringing twice. Jon then fined **Doug Ute** for the successful Newark Girls Basketball Team making it to the State Tournament. We also congratulated the boys for a great season. Jon asked if we had any Pickerington residents/natives, and then proceeded to fine them all for them beating the boys basketball team. **Jerry Krebs** got a fine for the best St. Patty's costume. Jon also fined everyone without a name badge. Lastly, Jon tried to fine President Jack Neely, who volunteers at Dawes Arboretum, for boiling water instead of sap like he was supposed to do. **Erin Prescott** spoke up and offered to cover his fine for him.

Program: **Fred Ernest** introduced our speaker, Aaron Domini with OHM.

Aaron, who started off by stating that he feels that the autonomous vehicle will forever change our lives just like the train, introduced his

two guest speakers, Justin Robbins (Senior Planner) and Jason Sudy (Principal/Senior Planner).

Jason began by letting us know that they aren't here to sell us on anything, or that they feel we should have an autonomous vehicle, rather only to educate us on what's going on in this field. Justin then explained the thoughts people once had when trains and cars first came along and how those people didn't feel these ideas were practical, nor would they last. They highlighted many reasons why we would benefit from autonomous vehicles. Among the most important was a 14 percent increase in vehicle related deaths over the last few years; the largest increase in the last 50 years.

They showed a list of current major investors in this field, including, Apple, Audi, BMW, Jaguar, Tesla, Toyota, VW, Google, Ford, Microsoft, Mercedes, GM, Honda, among many others. Ford is actually re-branding their company as a, "Mobility Company," to prepare for the ability to have both live drivers, as well as, autonomous capabilities. Tesla already has a model that has full autonomy.

Pittsburgh currently has an Uber available to pick you up and deliver you in full autonomy. They showed a video of actual footage of a car driving in Level 5 autonomy (highest level possible). It used situational technology where the car understood its surroundings and knew right where it was going.

Tesla has ideas of a shared plan where your car could run other people around and make you money while you sit there. Elon Musk, founder of Tesla, said back in 2015, that half of all cars produced in the next 7-8 years will be fully autonomous.

Justin and Jason went on to describe another great advantage of this movement, would be to free up wasted space which today is lost to parking. Parking is the No. 1 constraint for development in almost any context. If autonomy comes along in the next 15-20 years, we'll have to rethink development and will be able to develop on most of the parking that is being used now.

They are trying to encourage leaders and cities to plan with these possibilities in mind. The cost for this technology is rapidly coming down, so more autonomous features will eventually be included in the standard cost of a new car.
