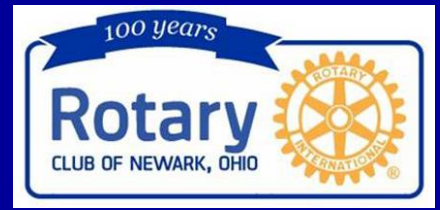

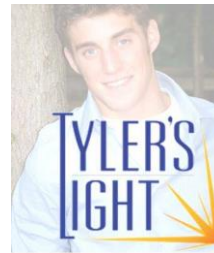

- **Angie Ryan** updated the club that the auction goal was met, raising just over \$50,000. She thanked many special helpers and the entire club for their participation.

Program: Rick Platt introduced John Carey, chancellor of the Ohio Department of Higher Education. John shared that Ohio has many various opportunities for high education. Apart for the traditional four-year route, a number of alternative pathways to a degree or certificate are on the rise. Currently, 43% of Ohioans have a college degree, certification or some post-secondary education. That number needs to increase to 63% by 2025 to meet workforce needs.

There are currently more people in non-traditional tracts versus traditional tracts. In Licking County, OSU-N and COTC serve as a great example of what a co-locating campus should be. More bachelor degree programs are being offered at regional campuses, and there is also the opportunity to transfer to Main Campus.

John's office continues to focus on what is best for students (four-year college, community college, private institution, etc.) and how to remove barriers to attending whatever institution is best. The College Credit Plus program is working to expose high school students to college work. The number of participating students has increased from 15,000 to 52,000, with \$110 million saved to date. The Ohio Department of Education wants students to know their options, so programs like Ohio Means Jobs and reliance on local-level individuals are helping to educate students on available career opportunities.

Ohio has demonstrated increased focus on affordability and efficiency. A priority has been freezing tuition at community colleges and four-year state institutions, with a challenge to reduce costs by 5%. Unfortunately, rising textbook costs and course fees are still a barrier. A possible efficiency comes with reducing remediation courses.

Lastly, career technical education programs, such as C-TEC, play an important part of ODE's work. Certification programs allow individuals to obtain a certificate and move on to a higher paying job in as little as 10 weeks. The One-Year Option allows students to complete one year in a technical education program and then complete a second year in an institution of higher education to complete an associate degree.
